Minutes Of General Meeting Of The Poetry Society Of Texas Saturday, May 10, 2025, 2:30 p.m., via Zoom by Recording Secretary Barbara Blanks

President Catherine L'Herisson welcomed our 24 attendees, and wished Happy Mother's Day to all the mothers present—and since we don't have a June meeting, she later wished an early Happy Father's Day to the fathers.

Corresponding Secretary Carol Thompson gave the April Membership Report for Membership Chair Lynn Lewis. Active Members 171, Associate

8, Life 30, Student 4, Honorary 5; Benefactor 1; Sustaining 3; Recently Deceased 0. We have two new Active members: Jerry Lovelady, Beaumont, and Lisa Holcomb, Tyler. And one new Sustaining/Active member: Rosemary Esehagu, Beaumont. PST welcomes you all! Total Membership: 223. Please encourage your chapter members to become members of PST to take advantage of the many things PST offers. We are one of the few societies that includes an anthology as part of our dues. Many other chapters make members pay for theirs in addition to dues. The 2025 A Book of the Year is in its final proofing.

Acting Treasurer Barbara Blanks gave the April Financial report. The largest expenditure involved the Student Contests and Awards. Even without an awards ceremony, the cost of mailing entries to the judges, printing and mailing the award certificates, then printing, shipping, and re-shipping the prize anthologies was extremely costly. If the Student Contests are held next year—and that will depend on someone or a chapter volunteering to be Poetry in Schools Chair—only prize certificates will be mailed. Amanda is editor of The Comstock Review, has authored two chapbooks, and is published in a variety of journals. Her website is poetrussell.wordpress.com. She read several of her poems.

Program Committee Michael Guinn introduced our Program Speaker, Joshua Clark, of Denton, who is also known as Sculpted Roses, and who founded Sculpted Roses Company. Roses loves flowers, especially roses, and used the rose to encompass all that he is as an artist, writer, songwriter, and life coach. He said, "Whether they're dead or in bloom, they are still precious." He addresses themes of faith, relationships, and mental health. He is the Texas Chapter President of the Poetry Business Network, and a member of the Rhythm of Poets, a new poetry collective in Denton. In addition to participating in numerous poetry and art shows throughout the DFW area, he has also been a featured voice at North Texas Giving Day. Roses aspires to spread messages of love and healing through his poetry and creative work. His website is www.sculptedrosescompany.com. Roses read several of his poems, saying he ends almost all of his poems with a "P.S."—a post script, a finishing afterthought. For instance, one of his poems about his best friend's mother who died last year, ends with "P.S. Can forever young be the end." In another poem he was inspired by the graffiti on three

side-by-side brick walls. His final poem was titled, "Ode to True Horror," which he said was a celebration of his guilty pleasure of liking horror movies. However, he added that his new definition of horror—good horror—was how some of the most precious things "give fear goose bumps," an example being, "falling in love is like falling to your death—and I'll drink to the horror of love every time."

Laugh Lines have a 16-line limit. Oneline titles and spaces between stanzas do not count as lines, but all other lines do—including second line of a two-line title, epigraphs, form identifications, etc. Submit one typewritten copy for each contest entered as a .doc or .docx attachment. (Not in the body of the email) No PDF's, JPG's, artistic fonts, or artwork will be accepted. Type General or Laugh Lines in the upper left-hand corner. Type your name, address, phone number, and email address in the upper right-hand corner.

Eligible entries will only be accepted from Life, Student, and Active members who have paid their annual dues. In the midst of writing, please take time to make sure your membership with the Poetry Society of Texas (PST) is current. Annual membership dues are \$ 25.00 payable by the end of June each year (or \$ 500.00 for life.) While we send out reminders, we know life gets busy and dues payment can fall by the wayside.

You can be dropped from the rolls for failing to send dues by November 30. We know that you don't want to be dropped! Membership entitles you to enter the free monthly contests, PST annual contests - and the National Federation of State Poetry Societies (NFSPS) for a reduced fee. Paying your annual PST dues means that you are automatically a member of NFSPS. You also receive PST's The Bulletin and A Book of the Year. Membership allows you to join the PST-For Members Facebook group to

receive current information and links not available to the general public. Pay your dues and keep up with us!

Our general PST meetings are now held on Zoom, so you can attend no matter where you live. Our meetings provide current information, member-featured Spotlight poetry, program speakers, contest results - and fun! You can read about both societies at poetrysocietyoftexas.org and at nfsps.org. Take an active part in these organizations – they are well worth your time!

Catherine Case Lubbe Manuscript Contest: 2025 Requirements

Prize: The winning entrant will receive a cash prize of \$100 and fifty copies of an Amazon KDP published, market-ready, 6 by 9 inch soft-cover book (including editing, cover design, pricing, and ISBN registration). The winner will assume the cost of additional copies.

Who may enter: The competition is open only to active dues-paid members, life members, sustaining and supporting members, student members and officers writing in English. (Note: associate, honorary, and library members may not enter.). The manuscript must be original work by a single author. The winner must agree to three public readings from the book: (1) a reading for a PST monthly meeting; (2) a reading at the annual summer conference, following the announcement in November; (3) a third reading to be arranged by the author. Entry in the contest acknowledges agreement with these stipulations. Past winners of this CCL and Eakin contests will not be eligible to enter again until the seventh year after previously winning. The CCL committee will select a judge whose name will be announced when the winner is announced. All rights revert to the winner after publication.

Deadline: Manuscripts must be postmarked between June 1, 2025, and August 1, 2025.

Previously published material: The manuscript may include unpublished poems and poems previously published in journals and anthologies (not to exceed 25 percent of the whole submission) but may not include poems from poet's other books or chap books, print or electronic. The submitter must have rights to previously published poems at the time of submitting the manuscript.

Entry fee: \$10 payable by check to Poetry Society of Texas for each submitted manuscript. Multiple entries are allowed with separate fees.

Length: The submitted manuscript should contain between 45 and 60 pages of poetry, one poem per page, not including other written matter. Only poems submitted in the winning contest manuscript will be published. No poems may be added or replaced.

Format: (1) Submit a single printed copy of the manuscript. (1.5) Submit an electronic copy of the paper version. (2) No line of poetry shall contain more than 60 characters (letters, spaces, and punctuation). (3) The manuscript must have a title page without author identification. (4) The pages should be numbered. (5) It must include a table of contents. (6) It must be bound in some manner (manuscript clip preferred). (7) No identification should appear in the manuscript. (8) Manuscripts with poems that contain explicit sexual language or expletives will not be considered. Do not send the only copy of the manuscript. Manuscripts will not be returned.

Include these items separate from the manuscript: (1) A title page with an entrant's name, address, phone number, and email address. (2) A single copy of a poem from the manuscript. If your manuscript wins, this

poem will be printed in A Book of the Year and read at the awards banquet. This copy should have author identification and a note that it is part of your Lubbe manuscript. (3) In sending the manuscript, do not include a list of acknowledgements for previously published poems. The manuscript must not include previously published poems exceeding 25 percent of the whole. You may include such a list in the book if you are the winner. (4) Check for \$10.00 payable to PST for each manuscript entry.
