In 2006, Chris Mikesell wrote his first poem, "Transport," which won third place in a contest (prize: bronze-plated bragging rights). After a hiatus of 15 years (during which he wrote short-fiction and survived a pandemic), he began writing poetry consistently, first published in January 2022.

Significant themes in his work include community and cooperation (and their antitheses, isolation and individualism), family, grace, and the nature of poets and poetry. A San Jose, Calif., native, he moved to the Dallas, Texas, area in 2007, started teaching high school shortly thereafter, and has lived in Wylie since 2009.

His work can be found internationally in Griffel and Verandah, domestically in The Quarter(ly) Journal, diet milk magazine, Teach.Write, Carolina Muse, Honeyguide, and Poem Alone. In late September, he was a featured poet at Poetry on the Patio, a poetry/spoken word event hosted by Mudhook Bar & Kitchen in Cedar Hill, sponsored by Mike Guinn Entertainment. Acting Treasurer Barbara Blanks gave the August Financial report. PST is required to have general liability insurance for our in-person gatherings (only summer conference and awards banquet since Covid). Farmers Insurance rates increased to almost \$1,000/per year. State Farm offered a much more reasonable rate, saving us around \$800/year. Our highest income was from annual contest entry fees, with about one-fourth of that used for postage to mail entries to the judges.

Budd Powell Mahan will be retiring as Annual Contest Chair after the 2025 contest is concluded. If you or your chapter are interested in the job, please contact President Jahangiri. Also, Spotlight on Members Chair Catherine L'Herisson would like to retire from that position. The new chair needs to find only seven PST members to be the Spotlight Poet during the year. Please contact Catherine if interested in the position.

Per the intro provided by today's Spotlight Poet, President Jahangiri made the introduction: "We were desperate for a last minute Spotlight Poet, so we put the spot on Barbara Blanks, who hasn't been spotted anywhere since September, 2021. She also knows you don't really want to listen to any of her poetry, so she is going to subject you to actual good poetry written by real poets." Barb presented several poems, mostly from memory, by poets such as Edna St. Vincent Millay and Denise Levertov, including one about a hippopotamus by Patrick Barrington.

Steele. Galen, originally from Roseburg, Oregon, and now living in Fort Worth, said he "enjoys being a proud father, a squirrelly son, a weird

uncle, a rambunctious friend, and a grateful husband." He also learned early that "poetry was a powerful thing." He has been published in several anthologies, and has a debut collection, "Five Things," available for preorder from Finishing Line Press. He likes to make lists of five things as prompts to write his poems, while still trying to find common themes that hold them together. He read several of his generally short and humorous poems, which included such topics as memory (his being unable to memorize poems), and wearing paper clothes in the rain.
