MINUTES OF GENERAL MEETING OF THE POETRY SOCIETY OF TEXAS for Saturday, October 11, 2025, 2:30 p.m., via Zoom by Recording Secretary Barbara Blanks

President Holly Jahangiri welcomed our 27 attendees, which included two of our new Active members,

PST also paid for the Hilton Ross Greer Outstanding Service Award acrylic award, which will be presented at the November Awards Banquet, and paid an Honorarium to the judge of the Catherine Case Lubbe Manuscript Contest.

Budd Powell Mahan will be retiring as **Annual Contest Chair** after the 2025 contest is concluded. **Laurel Davis** of Monahans has accepted the position.

President Jahangiri introduced today's **Spotlight on Members** poet, **Rich Kenney**, Tyler. Rich says he is the type of guy who stops for a discarded, roadside paperback. He is a graduate from a fifth-grade classroom that featured a mimeograph machine and a film strip projector. He read several of his poems.

President Jahangiri also introduced our Program Speaker Chris Mikesell for Michael Guinn of our Program Committee who was temporarily unavailable. Chris, who lives in Wylie, wrote his first poem in 2006, which won third place in a contest. For the next 15 years he wrote short-fiction before writing poetry again and consistently. His work can be found internationally. In late September, he was a featured poet at Poetry on the Patio, a poetry/spoken word event hosted by Mudhook Bar & Kitchen in Cedar Hill, sponsored by Mike Guinn Entertainment. Chris's program was about "The Difference Between Writing Poetry and Writing Fiction." Essentially, of course, fiction is generally longer and takes more time to write, whereas poetry "can't have words that aren't worth anything." For those interested in stretching their writing to include fiction, it would be helpful to write prose poetry (prose but with all the elements of poetry—more about image than story) and/or Flash Fiction, which is fiction that usually contains somewhere between 99-1,000 words, and has a beginning, middle, and end—just like any story. He suggested reading authors you like—and don't like but who write well, then isolate items in their technique that work for you and learn from them. You can find Chris online at chrismikesell.com.

(Not in the body of the email) No PDF's, JPG's, artistic fonts, or artwork will be accepted. Type General or Laugh Lines in the upper left-hand corner. Type your name, address, phone number, and email address in the upper right-hand corner.

Eligible entries will only be accepted from Life, Student, and Active members who have paid their annual dues. Member Chris Irving began the meeting by sharing a close read by member Ann Howells of Soto's poem, "After Midnight." Howell said the main theme of the poem is how we take too much for granted in life.

Ten members shared their response poems, and member David Webb was the inspiration reader with his poem, "Does the River Go Anywhere?" Webb said he has found there are three types of poets: those who write with the intent of being published, those who are accidentally published, and those who write as therapy.

Nine members then shared "free" poems on PowerPoint, ending with Cade Huie reading and discussing the background of her free poem, "Emergence."

Beth Honeycutt read Susan Maxwell Campbell's prepared background information on November's Read and Response poet, Wallace Stevens. Living from 1879 to 1955, Wallace worked in New York law firms and was an insurance executive, as well as a poet. He is known for arguments with both Robert Frost and Ernest Hemingway.

To introduce him, Campbell read a mini close read of Stevens' poem, "The House was Quiet and the World was Calm," showing how Stevens' key device was repetition to make his poem succeed.

In the kudos section of the meeting, Neeta Nayak of McKinney shared her poem, "A 'girl' child, NO less," a tribute poem for her grandmother in India. The poem is one of seven chosen for recitation at the McKinney Literary Festival in August.
