Actually, she's just odd and twisted, but she *has* been published in places like *Writers' Journal*, *Beyond Centauri*, *Ilya's Honey*, *Writers' Digest* 5th Poetry Awards Collection, *Reader's Digest*, *ByLine Magazine*, *NFSPS Encore*, and several state anthologies, including PST's *A Book of the Year*. She has published 11 books of award-winning poetry, which no one buys because nobody wants to buy poetry—but they are for sale on Amazon anyway—hint hint.

She also wrote on assignment for *RubberStampMadness*, a national stamping magazine, and *The Senior Voice*, a local news magazine, and was the president/ editor of *A Galaxy of Verse*, a subscription literary anthology, for eight years. Several Board members will be retiring after this next term. If you are interested in serving on the Board, please contact any current Board member **now**. If you care about PST and all it has to offer, please step up and help keep our organization alive.

Steve Sanders announced the results of the **William Barney D. Barney Memorial Chapbook Contest**. The judge was Lauren Kalstad, Dallas, a professor at the University of North Texas. Second runner-up: Raul Dominguez. First runner-up: Mike Baldwin. **Winner: Alen Gann**, Richardson, with his manuscript, "Consider the Dirt."

April is Poetry Month! If you or your chapter do anything to celebrate, please report it to Fred Manchester for publication in the Bulletin, and to Catherine L'Herisson for her report to NFSPS.

Our summer conference will be a one-day event, held on Zoom on July 11. We will have speakers, possibly a workshop, an open mic, and winners of the July Monthly contest will be announced. More details as they become available.

President Holly Jahangiri introduced our **Spotlight on Members** poet, **Vice President Michael Guinn**, N. Richland Hills. Mike holds a Master's degree in Social Work, and is an internationally renowned award-winning Spoken Word artist/actor/poet/workshop presenter. He is also a voting member of the recording academy and the NAACP image awards. Mike read two of his poems.

VP Michael Guinn introduced our **Program speaker, Kevin Prufer**. Kevin is the **2026 Texas Poet Laureate**, and an English Professor at the University of Houston, where he also directs The Unsung Masters Series, a book series devoted to rediscovering great, long forgotten authors. His book, *Churches*, was named one of the best ten books of 2015 by the New York Times, and *How He Loved Them*, was long-listed for the 2019 Pulitzer Prize and received the Julie Suk Award for the best poetry book from the American Literary Press. His work appears widely in Best American Poetry, The Pushcart Prize Anthology, and The Paris Review, among other publications. Kevin read several poems from his upcoming book, *Good People*, stating that they really were not good people, that the characters weren't "right"—how bad behavior rationalizes itself and turns it into good behavior. He said he is reluctant to write about himself or real people—that he would rather not tell the truth because "the world is bigger with non-truth." So he draws inspiration from real experiences and dead people while maintain a creative distance, because "like all of the dead, you are a kind of fiction." His background as a fiction writer influences his approach to poetry. He talked about the "poetic line," which is a powerful unit of thought. Line breaks are silences where the mind rests in unarticulated thought—until the next stanza comes to articulated thought.

Entries for the May contest should be sent between April 1 and April 15 review the complete Monthly Contest Rules on the PST website as they have changed. General Contest Poems have a 28-line limit with no more than 60 characters per line, including punctuation and spaces. Laugh Lines have a 16-line limit. One-line titles and spaces between stanzas do not count as lines, but all other lines do—including second line of a two-line title, epigraphs, form identifications, etc. Submit one typewritten copy for each contest entered as a .doc or .docx attachment. (Not in the body of the email) No PDF's, JPG's, artistic fonts, or artwork will be accepted. Type General or Laugh Lines in the upper left-hand corner. Type your name, address, phone number, and email address in the upper right-hand corner.

Eligible entries will only be accepted from Life, Student, and Active members who have paid their annual dues. Please don't forget to renew your PST membership prior to submitting your entries if you haven't done so already. HILTON ROSS GREER OUTSTANDING SERVICE AWARD 2016

Two members were nominated and approved by the board of directors as finalists for the 2026 Hilton Ross Greer Award. The finalists' biographies of service follow. Review the criteria for this award in *A Book of the Year*, read the biographies, and vote for the member whom you feel most deserves this prestigious award.

Anne McCrady

Anne, who currently serves as a PST councilor for the Tyler area, shares her work in print, in poetry presentations, and in workshops. She has coordinated and judged The Northeast Texas Poetry in Schools K-12 contest for 35 years. The contest was initiated around 50 years ago by Rusk County Poetry Society (RCPS) to recognize and award student poets during National Poetry Month in April of each year. Through the affirmation and encouragement of Evelyn Corry Appelbee, Anne became a member of the Poetry Society of Texas and RCPS, and became a prize-winning addition to both groups, as well as the National Federation of State Poetry Societies, Inc.

As an active RCPS life member, Anne has served in various local offices and presented poetry lessons to her chapter. Her guitar often accompanies her poetry. Anne has served as a PST chapter liaison for many years. Her prize-winning poetry is recognized in East Texas, in PST, and internationally.

Anne's book, *Along Greathouse Road*, was the 2003 winner of PST's Edwin M. Eakin Memorial Book Award. Other publications include *Under a Blameless Moon*, *Letting Myself In*, and *Kevin and the Seven Prayers*. She founded *InSpirity* in 2003 to launch her writing, speaking, and peace work – "to put her words to work for a better world," according to her website. Anne co-founded and helped direct the Art of Peace festival in Tyler for 12 years, producing eight international anthologies.

Anne is an inspirational speaker, presenting at literary, community, worship, and political events. As past PST president Richard Weatherly wrote about Anne, "her work most often examines the challenges, blessings, and transformations of living with an open heart." Anne's poetry lessons and workshops have been described as "interesting, useful, encouraging." As one poet put it, "when I read Anne's poems, I can hear Anne's voice." As an active and supporting member of PST since 1997, Anne was honored with the 2024 PST A Book of the Year (ABOTY) dedication, "because of her contributions and devotion to PST, plus her incredible body of work."

Even with a most impressive resume of accomplishments and awards, Anne McCrady's stand-out achievement is her willingness and ability to connect with other poets. Anne wholeheartedly lives her *InSpirity* credo: "Every Moment is Poetic – Every Life, an InSpirational Story!" Through her work at PST summer conferences, at Waco WordFest, and in so many other venues and ventures, Anne has brought countless poets together to workshop, form new friendships, and take inspiration from studying the craft of poetry. She has provided many poets with the opportunity to stand up, take the stage, and perform their poetry before an audience. Anne is an earnest, inclusive encourager and champion of poetry and poets. She is fully deserving of The Hilton Ross Greer Outstanding Service Award for 2026.

Steve Sanders

Steve first appears in A Book of the Year in 2013. He was at that time the President of Fort Worth Poetry Society. Early in his association with Poetry Society of Texas he became a member of the Bulletin Distribution Committee, the group responsible for mailing The Bulletin each month. He had the task of collecting the bags of newsletters and delivering them to the post office where the arduous steps of getting them sent was done. He did this job until The Bulletin went online.

Steve was involved with the William D. Barney Memorial Chapbook Contest from its inception, and because of his outreach was named a councilor for Fort Worth.

Also serving on the PST Executive Committee, Steve held the positions of Director and Treasurer in addition to serving on the Publicity Committee. He has in recent years been responsible for the mailing of A Book of the Year. This massive undertaking has him transporting heavy bags of books to the post office and insuring they are sent to each of PST's members.

During the pandemic, Steve served as host on Zoom for the annual awards and then hosted many of the subsequent board and general meetings for the society. Often a master of ceremonies, he hosted PST's 100th Anniversary Celebration and the Annual Awards Banquet the following day.

In 2023 PST board members hosted the Summer Conference. Steve acted as co-host. In 2025 he was involved with the Denton Poets Assembly Summer Conference Committee. He and his crew of Sea Dogs entertained at that conference as they had at two previous summer conferences.

Steve Sanders is more than deserving of the highest recognition of PST through his many years of dedication and service.

Denton Poets' Assembly

Denton Poets' Assembly shared response poems to Ha Jin's poems when 25 members met on Saturday, April 18. The meeting included 11 members in person at the Emily Fowler Library and 14 members via Zoom. Free original poems were also shared, along with close reads and inspiration reads.

To begin the meeting, member Paul Causey presented a close read of Ha Jin's poem, "All You Have is a Country," saying the poem reminded him that if we are not Native Americans, we are all immigrants to the United States. Causey said his great-grandmother immigrated to the U.S. by way of Galveston and then Comfort, Texas. In his analysis, Causey said Jin compares his birth country China to a bad watchdog. He also said Jin draws the reader into the poem by using "you" extensively, and Causey read the poem and exchanged every "you" with "I" to show the effect.

After Causey, member Susan Maxwell Campbell gave a mini close read of Jin's poem, "Missed Time," saying the poem presented a calm emptiness theme.

Fourteen members then read their response poems to one of Jin's poems. Member Eugene Kusterer presented an inspiration read of his poem "Whither," written as a response to Jin's "All You Have is a Country." Kusterer said he found Jin's poem "unstable and hopeless," which was the same way Kusterer is feeling lately.

Sixteen members then read their original free poems. This month's inspiration poet was Richard Kushmaul, who read a humorous poem titled, "Dressing in the Dark." Member Nickolai Lanier read Susan Maxwell Campbell's prepared information about the May read and response poet Wole Soyinka, a Nigerian-born poet who was a professor at Emory University, as well as Oxford, Harvard, and Yale. Soyinka won the Nobel Prize in literature in 1986, and he is known mostly as a playwright.
