Corresponding Secretary Carol Thompson gave the **April** Membership Report for **Membership Chair Lynn Lewis**. Active Members 157; Associate 10; Life 27; Student 3; Benefactor 1; Sustaining 2; Supporting 2; Library 1; Honorary 6. While Recently Deceased is 0, we just learned that Life Member John McCommas of Waco passed away in 2000. Total Membership: 211. We have two new Active members: Yolanda Wright, Alvarado, and Joe G. Grace II, Richmond. One new Associate member: Paula Sweeney Kowszik, Millbury, MA. PST welcomes you all!

Acting Treasurer Barbara Blanks gave a brief **April** Financial report. Primary expense was the Bulk Mailing Permit fee to the USPS. The 2026 **A Book of the Year** is ready. It will be sent to the printer as soon as we have a printing estimate.

Librarian Barbara Blanks had no book donations to report. However, she asked Cade Huie, winner of the 2025 Catherine Case Lubbe Manuscript Prize, to announce the title of her book: **A Sense of Stars**, now available on Amazon.

Holly called for nominations from the floor three times. No nominations. A vote was called by show of hands, and the presented slate was elected unanimously. The new Board seats on September 1.

Lynn Roberts Grice will be retiring as the Monthly Contest Chair after the December contest. If you are interested in assuming that position, please contact Lynn directly.

Please be sure to read your copy of the April Bulletin. It includes a ballot to vote for one of the **Hilton Ross Greer Outstanding Service Award nominees: Anne McCrady** and **Steve Sanders**. You may print and mail the ballot to Budd Powell Mahan, or you may email him your vote.

Our summer conference will be a one-day event, held on Zoom on July 11. We will have speakers, two workshops, the winners of the Wm Barney and Catherine Case Lubbe contests reading from their winning books, an open mic, and winners of the July Monthly contest. Registration links will be posted on the PST website. There is no charge for dues-paid members to attend. Non-members and Associate member will pay a \$20 registration fee.

Note: the open-to-the-public PST Facebook group has been shut down. The PST Facebook group For Members will be winnowed of non-members on July 1. There is also a PST Facebook PAGE, which is used to advertise PST—giving information about the society, and encouraging eligible people to join.

VP Michael Guinn introduced our **Program speaker, Barbara Blanks, of Garland**. He revised the intro she wrote to make her sound really good, which she appreciated. But since she is writing this report, she is not going to repeat any of his kudos here for fear of blushing. Or getting a swelled head. Regardless, Barbara's program was "Secrets of Winning

Poetry Contests.” Barb has a reputation for winning a lot of contests, and her “secrets” are simple: 1) Read the Rules. 2) Follow the Rules. 3) Send entries before the deadline. It sounds obvious, but she said a lot of entries are disqualified for not following those instructions. That, plus if you don’t enter, you can’t win. Two important things to remember: 1) Don’t let NOT winning discourage you. 2) Judges be crazy. One of the biggest reasons for disqualification is entering double-spaced or 1-1/2-spaced poems when the rules call for single space. See the instructions for changing your Word setting to single-space in the Files section of the PST-For Members group. Comply with each category requirement. Make sure of your line count, character count, font, and spacing comply with the rules. If you enter a syllabic and/or metered form, be sure the syllable counts and meter are correct. Know if the deadline is a Postmarked-by or Received-by date. Always print a copy of your poem, even if entering online. **Proof** the printed copy because you may spot errors you don’t see on your computer or phone screen. Barb firmly believes that learning to write different forms does NOT stifle creativity. Because Free Verse generally skims the surface of thoughts and emotions, it often tends to wind up as prose, especially if writing about history or telling a story or trying to be informative. She stated she wrote poems she never would have written if not for working with a poetry form. She likes the challenge of writing for contests, so she works hard at it. “Lazy poems don’t generally win.”

Entries for the July contest should be sent between June 1 and June 15 review the complete Monthly Contest Rules on the PST website as they have changed. General Contest Poems have a 28-line limit with no more than 60 characters per line, including punctuation and spaces. Laugh Lines have a 16-line limit. One-line titles and spaces between stanzas do not count as lines, but all other lines do—including second line of a two-line title, epigraphs, form identifications, etc. Submit one typewritten copy for each contest entered as a .doc or .docx attachment. (Not in the body of the email) No PDF's, JPG's, artistic fonts, or artwork will be accepted. Type General or Laugh Lines in the upper left-hand corner. Type your name, address, phone number, and email address in the upper right-hand corner.

Eligible entries will only be accepted from Life, Student, and Active members who have paid their annual dues. Please don't forget to renew your PST membership prior to submitting your entries if you haven't done so already. HILTON ROSS GREER OUTSTANDING SERVICE AWARD 2016

Two members were nominated and approved by the board of directors as finalists for the 2026 Hilton Ross Greer Award. The finalists' biographies of service follow. Review the criteria for this award in *A Book of the Year*, read the biographies, and vote for the member whom you feel most deserves this prestigious award.

Anne McCrady

Anne, who currently serves as a PST councilor for the Tyler area, shares her work in print, in poetry presentations, and in workshops. She has coordinated and judged The Northeast Texas Poetry in Schools K-12 contest for 35 years. The contest was initiated around 50 years ago by Rusk County Poetry Society (RCPS) to recognize and award student poets during National Poetry Month in April of each year.

Through the affirmation and encouragement of Evelyn Corry Appelbee, Anne became a member of the Poetry Society of Texas and RCPS, and became a prize-winning addition to both groups, as well as the National Federation of State Poetry Societies, Inc. As an active RCPS life member, Anne has served in various local offices and presented poetry lessons to her chapter. Her guitar often accompanies her poetry. Anne has served as a PST chapter liaison for many years. Her prize-winning poetry is recognized in East Texas, in PST, and internationally.

Anne's book, *Along Greathouse Road*, was the 2003 winner of PST's Edwin M. Eakin Memorial Book Award. Other publications include *Under a Blameless Moon*, *Letting Myself In*, and *Kevin and the Seven Prayers*. She founded *InSpirity* in 2003 to launch her writing, speaking, and peace work – "to put her words to work for a better world," according to her website. Anne co-founded and helped direct the Art of Peace festival in Tyler for 12 years, producing eight international anthologies.

Anne is an inspirational speaker, presenting at literary, community, worship, and political events. As past PST president Richard Weatherly wrote about Anne, “her work most often examines the challenges, blessings, and transformations of living with an open heart.” Anne’s poetry lessons and workshops have been described as “interesting, useful, encouraging.” As one poet put it, “when I read Anne’s poems, I can hear Anne’s voice.”

As an active and supporting member of PST since 1997, Anne was honored with the 2024 PST A Book of the Year (ABOTY) dedication, “because of her contributions and devotion to PST, plus her incredible body of work.”

Even with a most impressive resume of accomplishments and awards, Anne McCrady’s stand-out achievement is her willingness and ability to connect with other poets. Anne wholeheartedly lives her *InSpirity* credo: “Every Moment is Poetic – Every Life, an InSpirational Story!” Through her work at PST summer conferences, at Waco WordFest, and in so many other venues and ventures, Anne has brought countless poets together to workshop, form new friendships, and take inspiration from studying the craft of poetry. She has provided many poets with the opportunity to stand up, take the stage, and perform their poetry before an audience. Anne is an earnest, inclusive encourager and champion of poetry and poets. She is fully deserving of The Hilton Ross Greer Outstanding Service Award for 2026.

Steve Sanders

Steve first appears in A Book of the Year in 2013. He was at that time the President of Fort Worth Poetry Society. Early in his association with Poetry Society of Texas he became a member of the Bulletin Distribution Committee, the group responsible for mailing The Bulletin each month. He had the task of collecting the bags of newsletters and delivering them to the post office where the arduous steps of getting them sent was done. He did this job until The Bulletin went online.

Steve was involved with the William D. Barney Memorial Chapbook Contest from its inception, and because of his outreach was named a councilor for Fort Worth.

Also serving on the PST Executive Committee, Steve held the positions of Director and Treasurer in addition to serving on the Publicity Committee. He has in recent years been responsible for the mailing of A Book of the Year. This massive undertaking has him transporting heavy bags of books to the post office and insuring they are sent to each of PST's members.

During the pandemic, Steve served as host on Zoom for the annual awards and then hosted many of the subsequent board and general meetings for the society. Often a master of ceremonies, he hosted PST's 100th Anniversary Celebration and the Annual Awards Banquet the following day.

In 2023 PST board members hosted the Summer Conference. Steve acted as co-host. In 2025 he was involved with the Denton Poets Assembly Summer Conference Committee. He and his crew of Sea Dogs entertained at that conference as they had at two previous summer conferences.

Steve Sanders is more than deserving of the highest recognition of PST through his many years of dedication and service.

On Thursday, April 16, eight members of The Rusk County Poetry Society met at the South Main Church of Christ's multi-purpose building from 2:00-4:00 pm.

Ilenya Marrin, Richarrd Hurzeler, Sue Roberts, and Janet Tyner read their poetry during the Open Mic time. Shaped poems that had been written in

response to Lisa Holomb's lesson in March were handed in for feedback. Our new Facebook group, website, and Instagram account were unveiled as well.

The Spotlight Poet was Sharon Taylor, Ilenya Marrin presented a lesson on “Poetic Voice”, and Janet Tyner brought snacks..

We were all invited and encouraged to attend the Northeast Texas Poetry in Schools Awards Ceremony on Friday, April 24, 10:30 AM-Noon. The ceremony was held at the Region 7 Education Service Center in Kilgore. RCPS presented a \$500 scholarship to the first place winner in the graduating senior category. This year, thanks to the leadership of Justin Robinson, additional scholarships were presented to the graduating senior winners of second and third place, as well.

The next meeting will be held on May 21, 2026 at the South Main Church of Christ in Henderson and will include open mic time, Spotlight Poet Lisa Holcomb, and a lesson by Kim Taylor.

Denton Poets' Assembly

Saturday, May 16 the Denton Poets' Assembly held their monthly meeting with 12 attending in person and 14 attending online via Zoom.

Neeta Nayak started things off with a well-researched and personal close read of the poem “Telephone Conversation” by the Nigerian playwright and poet Wole Soyinka who won the 1986 Nobel prize in Literature. The poem was about a personal race discrimination event experienced by the Soyinka during a telephone inquiry about an apartment rental in England,

during the '60s. Neeta expressed her empathy for the poet having keenly felt the references to looks and accent herself as an immigrant. Neeta set the stage with a general description of 1960s England, the period of the poem. She thoroughly dissected the poem, placing it in the context of the poet's work, technique, structure, and the atmosphere of racism of the times. Neeta also brought out how in the poem the poet was first surprised by the unexpected racism, his evolving real time reaction to the situation as it was unfolding, and in the end a climatic triumph... served with a good dose of clever humor.

This presentation set the stage for the thirteen Read/Respond poems to follow by DPA poets: Chris Boldt, Brian Bowles, Roger Busséll, Paul Causey, Nancy De Honores, Ann Graham, Chris Irving, James Neisender, Sebastian Penalilio, Robert Schinzel, and Inspiration Reader David Webb. David Webb's poem, "Aftermath of a Massacre, Anytime" was in response to Soyinka's "Massacre, October '66". David's poem highlighted man's historical propensity for mass murder, initiated by tyrants but routinely carried out by detached duty focused bureaucrats.

The Free Choice portion of the meeting included poems submitted by Chris Boldt, Brian Bowles, Roger Busséll, Susan Maxwell Campbell, Paul Causey, Nancy De Honores, Ann Graham, Christine Irving, Richard Kushmaul, Eugene Kusterer, Sebastian Penalillo, and Shiny Wu. The Free Choice Inspiration read was given by Cade Huie. "A Sense of Stars" is the first poem in Cade's newly published (available at Amazon) book of the same title. The manuscript for this book was PST's 2025 Catherine Case Lubbe contest winning entry. This two-stanza poem appears to start out as a simple yet clever appreciation of nighttime stars but explodes into layers of meaning, inference, and interpretation.

Susan Maxwell Campbell's Power Point introduction to June R/R poet Sharon Olds, read and presented by Paul Causey set the stage for our next meeting. . This was followed by Susan's mini-close read of Sharon Olds Poem "Rite of Passage"

Close out for the May meeting then featured a Kudo's reading of Shiny Wu's PST Annual Contest #54 winner "Jasmine Across the Silk Road" This contest was offered last year by Robert Schinzel for the "best poem on Geography – finding spatial relationship between things and places and people, whether physical, cultural, or historical". For a precious moment, Shiny took us back to other times and places as we mindfully traveled and experienced the ancient "Silk Road"
